#### **Guiding questions for the group discussions**

World Café: Co-development of the BE-Rural Policy Paper "Promoting Effective Co-creation Spaces in the Bioeconomy" with a focus on four targeted policy recommendations

- 1. Recommendation #1: Increase support for innovative formats to encourage citizen dialogue and better capture feedback on regional bioeconomy issues
  - What challenges arose in incorporating citizen feedback into regional strategic documents?
  - How could citizen engagement activities be improved to better capture this feedback?
  - What policy instruments provide the best enabling framework for such citizen engagement activities?
- 2. Recommendation #2: Create new or promote existing frameworks at regional level that support bioeconomy stakeholders in implementing capacity building activities
  - Is insufficient knowledge of the bioeconomy amongst many stakeholders preventing the
    use of more interactive tools? How can the use of practical tools or techniques that allow
    for active exchange be encouraged?
  - Do you know of existing frameworks where support for capacity building could be integrated?
  - How can the interest of stakeholders in capacity building and knowledge exchange events not only be increased, but also sustained over time?
- 3. Recommendation #3: Enable regional multi-actor partnerships to formulate inclusive bioeconomy strategies and roadmaps
  - What are the requirements for Local Action Groups to contribute to the development of regional bioeconomy strategies and roadmaps (e.g. awareness of the bioeconomy, policy framework, engagement tools, organisational aspects)?
  - How to build on and strengthen existing networks (e.g. regional clusters, local action groups) while, at the same time, going beyond them by involving new actors, thereby ensuring inclusiveness of the activities and outputs?
  - By which means could synergies with parallel initiatives be created (e.g. joint working groups, seminars etc.) to maximize the (political) relevance of bottom-up activities and outputs?
- 4. Recommendation #4: Upskill entrepreneurs to design their bioeconomy products and business models the basis of a) real market needs and b) serious consideration of ecological limits
  - What are the main challenges faced by our regions and which of these are of highest priority for their communities? Can the concept of sustainable bioeconomy become a means to generate real solutions to these priority challenges? If so, how?
  - Sustainable bioeconomy as an economic development model cannot assume unlimited growth. How does this affect its attractiveness against other alternatives for our regions? How capable are entrepreneurs and economic planners today to take serious stock of the capacities of the regional environment to absorb additional pressures from economic development?

<u>Creating and maintaining a pan-European Network of Knowledge: Exchange between regional stakeholders</u>

- 1. Policy group: translating bioeconomy strategies and roadmaps into policy and public funding streams
  - How can you integrate your region's bioeconomy activities into existing policy frameworks and link it to current strategies?
  - How can the involvement of stakeholders be ensured in the implementation of your bioeconomy strategy or roadmap?
  - What are support frameworks that should be provided by policy-makers to facilitate the implementation of your bioeconomy strategy or roadmap?

# 2. Research group: integrating the bioeconomy in educational systems and collaboration with the private sector

- Is there interest from educational/science institutions to integrate the bioeconomy in educational & research systems in your region or are there steps being made in this direction? What programmes need to be developed in educational/science institutions in order to provide the skills for the emerging bio-based sector?
- What kind of support is needed in order to adapt current educational curricula at regional and local level from the perspective of policy, funding, capacity building, etc.?
- How could the gap between R&D and industry be closed (i.e. collaboration between companies and research/science institutes and universities)? What are the experiences from your region – who are the actors involved; what funding is available; what are the challenges?

#### 3. Business group: regional business opportunities and funding for the bioeconomy

- What is the bioeconomy business potential in the region in terms of availability of biomass, technological applications, bio-based products produced, business developments?
- In what kind of (cross-border) cooperation in the field of bioeconomy are businesses in the region involved?
- In which funding sources/programmes available for the bioeconomy are you interested in or have used in the past? What are the activities you have funded / you are interested to fund / you are interested to cooperate on (incl. internationally)? Are there funding gaps you have identified?
- Could the existing policy frameworks be improved to support regional businesses (e.g. related to regulations, market uptake, public procurement, etc.)?
